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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Government Brijindra College is a premier educational institution of the Malwa region in Punjab. Established in the year 1942, in the memory of HH Maharaja Brijinder Singh of Faridkot, the college is affiliated to Punjabi University, Patiala (Punjab). Since its inception, the college has touched the highest pinnacles of glory, and got accredited with Grade "A" by NAAC in 2004 and 2016. True to its motto "Knowledge is Power," which is strongly expressed in the vision of providing education and enlightening the people of the educationally backward Malwa Belt of Punjab, the college is a torch bearer in carrying forward the light of knowledge to every nook and corner of this area. The faculty of the institution has always tried to empower and enlighten students with knowledge and equip them with leadership and managerial skills to make them effective participants in the changing global scenario. The age old noble traditions of the college make the institution surge towards excellence. 1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The institution strives to bring about holistic development of students by encouraging them to actively participate in academics, sports, culture and other co-curricular activities leading to skill development and enhancement of employability of students. The institution considers it as its utmost responsibility to transform students into independent decision makers with excellent managerial skills by supplementing classroom

learning with relevant practical knowledge.

The college offers B.A., B.Com., B.Sc. Medical and Non-Medical, B.Sc. Agriculture, BCA and Post-Graduation in Punjabi, Economics, English, Music and Chemistry. Besides the affiliated courses, in order to bridge the industry academia gap, the college offers various value-added courses. The entire teaching fraternity of Govt. Brijindra College, Faridkot considers carrying out the curriculum delivery effectively and smoothly as its sacred responsibility. To ensure zero slackness on this front, work schedule and academic calendar are prepared department wise. A Master Time Table is framed as per the instructions of the university in keeping up with the requirements of the UGC. Teaching methodology is a balance of traditional chalk and talk method, and modern innovative ICT enabled pedagogy. The institution takes keen interest in continuous internal evaluation of the students across various parameters of development. The institute organizes various inter/intra-departmental guest lectures, workshops and seminars packed with useful, up-to-date information and insights needed to address real-world market needs. For effective implementation of the curriculum, students of Science and Agricultural stream are regularly taken on industrial visits and trips to State/ National Research Centers and universities.

About six senior faculty members of the institute find representation in various Board of Studies of the university and are instrumental in designing/reframing curricula for various courses. The institute is committed to the cause of gender sensitivity, environmental sustainability, human values and professional ethics. Students are sensitized on various regional, National and International issues and other cross cutting issues with the help of NSS and various clubs like Red Ribbon Club, Sur Aangan Society, Shikra Eco Club etc. An efficient feedback system that involves various stakeholders like parents, teachers and alumni helps to maintain the checking of effectiveness of curriculum design and delivery.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

This college is the first choice of students and parents from Faridkot and neighboring regions because of its highly qualified and experienced teaching faculty imparting easily accessible and cost effective high quality education along with a safe, conducive and eco-friendly atmosphere. The state of art infrastructure in science, agriculture, commerce and arts departments is another reason of attraction for the students. The college makes every effort to ensure transparency and impartiality in the admission process. The dates of admission to various courses offered by the college are advertised through mass media and the college website. The student enrollment is done strictly on the basis of merit on the DGR portal of Punjab Govt since 2022-23. Prior to this admission was conducted on the college admission portal by committees specially made for this purpose. The guidance and counseling cell plays a significant role in making a wise choice of subjects by students keeping in view their interests and job prospects.

Reservation policy of the Government is strictly adhered to by the college to ensure an intake of a requisite number of these students in each course as per the norms prescribed by the government. The number of students of reserved categories mostly exceeds the requisite number set by the govt. Students are guided to avail scholarships announced by state/central governments by putting notices on various notice boards in the college along with messages by the mentor groups.

Various talent hunt programmes are organized from time to time by the Cultural wing and Music department to identify and fine tune the skills and talent of the students. Sports students are given admission to the department

of physical education after assessing their athletic abilities. Students with outstanding achievement are suitably rewarded with concessions.

The meritorious and deserving students from economically weaker strata are provided financial help from Student aid fund of the college. Sports persons are given fee concession, sports kit, hostel accommodation, travelling expenses and special coaching by the college according to the university norms. Above facilities are also provided to students participating in cultural/academic events.

The college measures the achievements of students by adopting formative and summative evaluation in semester classes. Continuous internal assessment is determined on the basis of behavior, regularity, punctuality and discipline of students in classrooms.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college has the distinction of having in its faculty outstanding scholars whose erudition has been recognized at National and International levels. Currently there are 66 full time teachers out of which 22 are PhDs and many others have enrolled for PhD.

The staff is actively engaged in getting research papers published in Refereed Peer Reviewed Research Journals and in the proceedings of National and International seminar/conferences. Many books with ISBN no. have been published by the faculty members. To imbibe research culture among the staff and students, different departments organize seminars and workshops in which learned and erudite scholars interact with students and staff.

In order to sensitize students to social issues and to bring about their holistic development, extension activities are carried out in the neighbourhood community. The college effectively runs 5 units of NSS (National Service Scheme) and has adopted one village Chahal and one basti Jogian Wali. NSS organizes several one day camps every year in nearby villages and several activities are carried out by NSS volunteers through Shramdan addressing social issues, environmental issues and medical issues. In these camps various social issues are addressed which include value based education, creating gender equality, environment conservation, cleanliness drive, educating the people, water conservation, conserving our indigenous culture and values, career guidance and counseling etc. All the above mentioned activities have positive impact on the students and develop student community relationship, leadership skills and self confidence of students leading to holistic overall development of the students.

An earnest effort is made to make students aware of their rights along with their duties and responsibilities towards the society. The institution celebrates various days of National and International importance to make the students proud of their country and their duty to carry the rich heritage of their country ahead. The national voters' day is celebrated to make the students responsible voters. Students are indulged in various activities through NSS and NCC to build a sustainable relation with the environment as well as the society.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Govt Brijindra college can boast of a sprawling, lush green and eco-friendly complex spread in 35 acres with 8 separate blocks for different faculties: Virasati Arts Block, Kalpana Chawla science block, Biology Block, Commerce block, Computer block, Agriculture block, Guru Teg Bahadur block and PG block.

- College has 57 spacious well ventilated classrooms and modern laboratories fitted with latest equipments in all science departments, agriculture department as well as BCA department.

6 Smart lecture theatres and rooms fitted with Multimedia Projector/OHP, 3 interactive panels and 1 Smart Podium fitted in class rooms for the use of teachers and students.

- Well equipped and maintained library with approximately 47667 books and Periodicals and a large number of magazines and an established e-Library

- Big agriculture farm well equipped with modern implements to provide hands on learning to the students and farmers.

- The college has made its mark in cultural activities with a **recording centre** for the students who want to make their mark in the field of singing and an **Open Air Theatre** with seating capacity of approximately 500 students used not only for the organization of college functions but by various NGOs and social organizations.

Student Support and Progression

The institution has a well founded student support system.

Students from SC/ST /OBC/ physically disadvantaged categories are helped and guided to get scholarships from State/Central Governments. Students from economically weaker sections are provided financial aid from SAF. Departmental book banks provide books to the underprivileged and deserving students. Remedial classes free of cost are given to slow learners.

- Student participants in various National and International competitions are provided free diet, boarding, lodging and travelling.
- In case of any kind of medical problem, preliminary medical assistance to students is made available by Red Cross Unit of college. In case of an emergency, free treatment is provided by GGS Medical College or Civil Hospital Faridkot.
- Tours and excursions are organized to institutions of higher learning of National and International repute/ corporate/business houses/Biodiversity rich areas to provide an exposure to students and interact with experts.
- College publishes magazines 'The Brijinder' to promote creativity amongst students and to give expression to the thoughts of budding writers. Student editors manage editing and designing of their respective sections.
- Special Cell for Prevention of Violence and Sexual Harassment against Women resolves issues pertaining to sexual harassment and gender bias.
- Anti-Ragging Committee, and Grievance Redressal Cell redress Grievances and cater to the welfare of students.
- College has very high pass percentage of students, however the students who are at risk of dropout are provided financial and material help. College organizes remedial classes, stress bursting sessions, moral boosting sessions and problem solving discussions for such students.
- To provide an opportunity to students to exhibit their skills and talent in the field of culture, fine arts, literature, music and other activities and to promote communal harmony and leadership quality in students, they are encouraged to participate in Zonal and Inter zonal Youth Festivals. The college has a long and glorious tradition of participating and winning at all levels of Youth Festivals. The college has always bagged top positions at Zonal youth festivals from 2017- 2022. The Sur Angan society of the college promotes students for stage performances
- The institution has carved a special niche for itself in the field of sports and games by winning laurels in a large number of games.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The college campus is a host to various events and functions that are celebrated to pay tribute to national integrity. Active participation of students and teachers alike in the organization of functions on occasion of Independence Day, Republic Day, Swami Vivekananda Jayanti (National Youth Awareness Day), Guru Purab, Women's Day, Gandhi Jayanti, Sardar Vallabh Bhai Patel Jayanti. - The principal was appointed DPI nominee to represent state of Punjab at the meeting held at MGNCRE Hyderabad (MoE Govt of India)
- The principal was awarded certificate of appreciation MGNCRE Hyderabad (MoE, Govt of India) for organizing a district level workshop on “Promoting social Entrepreneurship based vocational education” on Nov 16th, 2022.
- The principal believes in participative management and works in close association with College Council, PTA and HEIS. In order to implement the decisions regarding the welfare of the student, administrative team comprising of members of IQAC, Registrar Examinations and various other committees are formed. All committees work in unison to offer high quality standards in academic, cultural, sports and managerial field.
- The students are trained for leadership and governance by making them in-charges of various activities in the college. Student ambassadors are selected for motivating students to get registered as voters by the SVEEP branch of the college.
- Students play a very important part in community service activities organized by NSS. They offer shramdaan in Swachh Bharat abhiyaan and participate in pulse polio mission, donate blood to the people. They also play an important part in guiding the students for online admissions by setting up a help desk for assisting fellow students.
- The IQAC committee has student representatives who take active part in planning and implementation of various aspects of institutional operations and procedures of the IQAC committee.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The college has many healthy practices for the physical, mental, social, economic, political, moral and ethical development of the students.

Blood Donation Camp: An annual blood donation camp is organised on 19th September every year in which students and the staff of the college zealously participate in donating blood which can save numberless lives.

Book Fair: An annual 5 days book fair is organized in the college which is a very good effort to connect the students with books in the time of social media.

To create **patriotic feelings** and a sense of duty in the students, the college celebrates all the days of National importance like Independence Day, Republic Day, Gandhi Jayanti and National Integration Day etc.

Awareness of rights and duties as citizens of the biggest democracy in the world is created in students by celebrating National Voters’ Day annually on 25 January. The idea is to catch the students young and make them aware of the snares waiting for them in the political scenario of the country and how to avoid them judiciously.

Moral values are created in students by organising Kirtan on Sankrant of every month in the Gurudwara Sahib of the hostel of the college. The entire arrangement is done by the students teaching them managerial skills.

Community welfare activities: NSS volunteers are trained in community welfare activities like adult education, cleanliness of slum areas, creating awareness against female foeticide and child labour etc. Red Ribbon Club inspires students and people of the area to ‘say no to drugs’ and also makes them aware of AIDS, the major killer in modern times. The college celebrates Earth Day, Water Day, soil day, Environment Day and Van Mahotsava Day etc. Cleanliness of campus is maintained under 'Swachh Bharat Abhiyan' started by Govt.

of India. Students learn about the importance of cleanliness.

All the department have **Departmental Book Banks**, which issue free books to needy students.

The college has initiated a new concept to help needy students by setting up a corner in the library which is named as **Imaandaari Ki Dukaan**. Students and staff donate books for this corner which are sacked properly. Any student who needs them can enter his name in the register and carry the book when needed and return when he has read the book. This helps the students to read books which they cannot purchase.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

More students are encouraged to open ABC everyday.

Recently 4 add on courses have been introduced by Jagat Guru Nanak Dev University and 2 Courses of Sanskrit have been offered by Central Sanskriti University for skill development of the students. The college has continuously offered opportunities for students to develop their skills in tandem with changing needs. The curriculum is aligned with field visits, visit to relevant industries and project works to make the students job ready by the time they graduate. Students' skills are further augmented by frequent interactions with alumni and industry experts. This enhances their preparedness for the world outside the college.
4. The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

To ensure effective curriculum delivery, the college develops annual academic calendar according to the guidelines laid down by the UGC and Punjabi University, Patiala. It also follows the norms of the University for the conduct of continuous internal assessment.

A well planned and documented process including academic calendar for effective curriculum delivery

The institution follows three types of calendars:

1. University calendar
2. College Calendar
3. Departmental Calendar

The institution is affiliated to Punjabi University Patiala which prepares an academic calendar at the beginning of each semester. The academic calendar helps faculty members to plan their respective course delivery, academic and co-curricular activities accordingly. The guidelines issued by Punjabi University Patiala are followed for the teaching learning process. The teaching and technical staff has to follow time bound schedule of the University for the smooth and in-time completion of the prescribed syllabi including revision in each subject.

The dates for Class Tests and Mid Semester Test to assess the students' performance and also to fulfill the requirements of eligibility criteria for university examinations are fixed according to the College calendar. Requisite stay of the faculty, providing appropriate credit hours to theory and practical in course work, optimum utilization of available infrastructural facilities according to student's requirements is ensured by IQAC committee. The organization of College Level Seminars/ Symposia/ Workshops and Extension Lectures in different departments are planned to provide better opportunities for students and faculty to interact and exchange their views.

Apart from the academic calendar issued by the university and the college, various departments of the college also make their own calendar in which the syllabi is divided according to the time schedule in which it is completed. The departments also schedule various programmes which are to be organized by them during the semester.

Mid semester exams are conducted by the examination branch and it is mandatory for all the students to attempt and pass in them. The question papers are prepared by the faculty strictly in adherence to the university paper pattern. All the students have to undergo the mid semester tests. However, those

students who are unable to pass these exams or are unable to take these due to participation in NSS, music or sports tournaments, or due to some unavoidable circumstances like sickness or any other problem, for them re-tests are conducted.

Internal Assessment tests (IA), assignments, quizzes, and seminars are part of the Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) of students. Continuous evaluation and assessments are also done for practical courses, experimental field works and project works. Students perform experiments as per demonstrations given by teachers and are evaluated on the basis of practical and viva. There is a well-defined process for the conduct of CIE as per the calendar of events. The process of Internal assessment is transparent and clear based on the marks obtained in MSTs, assignments, classroom behavior, participation in the classroom discussions and attendance of the students.

Faculty organises and invigilates these exams and participate in the evaluation process to facilitate declaration of results on time.

The IQAC mandates analysis of results by departments and an action taken report by Departments regarding remedial measures to improve results.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

Response:

Govt. Brijindra College is committed to the holistic development of students by engaging them in experiential learning, participative learning and problem-solving methodologies to enhance their learning experience. Students are encouraged to expand their learning horizons beyond the curriculum and classrooms to outreach programmes via hands on experiences with the community at large.

Experiential Learning through NSS: There are five units of NSS with approx 500 students. NSS helps develops students' experiential and participative learning by collaborative projects with the outside community. Various activities like gender sensitization, Adult Literacy Programmes, AIDS awareness programmes, Cleanliness of Campus/Villages, Women Empowerment programmes, Seminars on social issues, Promotion of leadership and artistic qualities etc are carried out by these Units of NSS. Students are trained to become good human beings and good citizens of the country.

To increase the institute-community interface, the college has adopted 2 villages: Chahal and Jogian wali Basti to enhance the understanding of the finer nuances of village life and to resolve the basic problems of the people of these villages by extending a helping hand to them.

Field visits: Regular interface with the relevant industry is maintained through Industrial and Field Trips which enhance the theoretical concepts taught in classrooms. These field trips are carried out by Departments of Agriculture, Geography, Botany, Zoology, Chemistry, Physics, political science ,music etc to give practical training to students.

Practical training: Botanical garden of the college and Agriculture farm are the assets of the college used to give hands on training to the students.

Training from Experts: State level coaches are engaged to train students for different games viz; Hockey, Cricket, Athletics, Volleyball, Handball, Wrestling, Kabaddi, Swimming etc. for competing at Zonal/Inter- Zonal/ Inter university level competitions.

Experts from outside are also engaged to train students for various cultural activities including fine arts items, theatre items, music items etc. to compete at the Zonal/Inter Zonal/ Inter university level competitions.

The teachers are trained to combine technology with traditional mode of instruction to engage students in long term teaching learning process. College uses **ICT** in education to support, enhance, and optimize the delivery of education.

Smart Classrooms: There are eight smart classrooms with over-head mounted projectors and speakers for use of audio-visual resources and have been very useful for class presentations and in the use of power point presentations and screening of relevant films. There is one smart hybrid classroom equipped with state-of-the-art multi-media teaching aid with 65 inches LCD internet enabled interactive screen with interactive panel and visualiser with embedded scanners, cameras and speakers.

Teaching–Learning shifted to the online platform completely from March 2020 onwards due to the outbreak of the Covid pandemic with the ensuing lockdown leading to the closure of colleges. The college facilitated this transition with teachers taking Online Classes on various E-Platforms like Google Meet, Zoom, Microsoft Team etc. during the session 2020-21.

Teachers provided online teaching, Power Point presentations, Online quiz along with online counselling to students to help them maintain mental and physical balance during the testing Corona period.

The traditional teaching was supplemented with online paper reading contests, chart making, Poster making competitions, Scrap Book making competitions, Project presentations etc.

Teachers use various ICT tools for conducting workshops, Webinars and expert Lectures on various topics for the physical and mental well being and upliftment of the students.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Internal assessment mechanism is transparent and robust in terms of frequency, mode and response. As per the guidelines issued by Punjabi University, Patiala, the process of Internal Assessment is adequately structured. The schedule of mid semester tests is displayed in academic calendar and on college website. The students are informed about the division of percentage in the internal assessment at the very beginning of the session. To ensure rigor and transparency, the internal assessment marks are awarded in the following manner:

- 1.20% of the marks are allotted to students' class room attendance . The students are informed about their classroom lectures and are encouraged to attend regular classes.
- 2.40% of the marks are given on the basis of marks obtained in Mid semester exams which are

conducted by Examination Branch of the college and class tests taken by the subject teachers. Mid semester tests are conducted in perfect consistency with university pattern: question papers are set as per guidelines of university and answer scripts are evaluated and distributed to students so that they can discuss their problems with the teachers. Special tests are conducted for students participating in various co curricular activities like NCC camps, youth festival and tournaments etc. and also for those who could not qualify the mid semester exams due to unavoidable circumstances. The awards are submitted online at college examination portal. Class tests, quizzes and surprise tests are also conducted by the faculty to judge the learning skills of the students.

- 3.40% of the marks are awarded on the basis of project work/assignments and/or practicals done by the students in practical subjects along with independent reading and class room behaviour of the students.

All these marks are clubbed to form consolidated internal assessment of the student which is then sent to the university.

Grievance Redressal System: To maximize transparency and efficiency in examination related grievances, the college has an examination branch with faculty from all the streams, headed by a registrar. The schedule of internal and external examination and the re-appear schedule is communicated to the students by displaying the date sheet on college website, college notice boards as well as circulation through WhatsApp groups by the mentors.

The institution has a transparent, time- bound and efficient **three-tier mechanism** to deal with internal examination related grievances.

Teacher: The students can complain about any aberration in the marking of paper to the concerned faculty. The teachers try their best to remove the grievances of the students in an unbiased and judicious manner.

Exam Branch: If the student is not satisfied with the explanation of the teacher related to his problem, he can go to the examination branch for the same. The examination branch has teachers from every department who lend a patient ear to the students and solve their problems in every possible manner.

Principal: If the grievance persists. the student is free to approach the college principal who is the final authority in solving the internal exam related grievances.

Grievances related to the University Examinations are taken on priority basis and the university is contacted within the time limit of three working days for early redressal.

Govt. Brijindra College is a constituent college of Punjabi University Patiala and follows the prescribed revised Learning Outcomes-based Curriculum Framework syllabus in both letter and spirit. The syllabus of every course and further every paper is made available to the faculty teaching along with well-defined learning outcomes. This helps both faculty and students in the teaching learning process as there is a well-defined framework in terms of both learning outcomes and the time schedule on a weekly basis. There is a structured and efficient mechanism for attainment of the Programme Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) in the college. The IQAC of college follows a specific and systematic methodology for the success of the same. Direct attainment is evaluated on the basis of result of Mid-Semester and Final Semester Examination conducted by college and university respectively. CO

attainment is evaluated through assignments, seminars, viva voce, etc. Routine evaluation is done by oral/written tests in class room. The Mid-Semester Examination and the written class tests are conducted according to the examination pattern followed by the affiliating university to help the students to prepare and perform better in the final examinations.

The results and feedback of the students is a proof of attainment of programme outcomes and the same is analysed periodically by departments and remedial action taken accordingly.

A merit list of students is prepared by the Examination branch every year and Meritorious students are awarded at the Annual Day celebrations. The merit list is published in the Annual Report to acknowledge the hard work of the students. This motivates them and other students to excel. The final results of the students are provided to the departments who analyse them paper wise and devise remedial mechanisms for improvement. This could be by way of extra practicals or shifting of faculty to another paper. For example, after result analysis of semester 1 & 2 students, one of the departments felt that the teaching of first year students should be done by more experienced faculty in order to build a stronger foundation for first year students. Likewise, faculty takes into account feedback of students and allocate papers amongst themselves.

The College ardently aspires to cultivate the spirit of innovation and research in the students along with bringing them close to Indian handicraft system and develop these skills as their professional skills.

Indian Knowledge System: The institute holds **Virasat Mela** every year in which students are encouraged to learn and display skills from our culture like embroidery, mitti ke Khilone, parandi making, guddi patola making, and other fast vanishing Punjabi handicrafts.

Guru Gobind Singh Study Circle (Faridkot Muktsar Bathinda Zone) organises a three days Virsa camp every year for the holistic development of students. Our college students diligently participate in the camp. In the year 2022-23, 14 students from different departments participated in the camp. This camp aims at moral and ethical development of students leading to their all-round personality development. There are group and panel discussions, self- evaluation sessions, sports activities, slide shows and movies related to our culture and history and various seminars for the mental and moral building of the students.

Skill Development and Incubation centre:

Visit to Fish Farm: The college aims to develop various professional skills in students. With this aim students of B.Sc. medical are taken for a visit to the fish farm so that students can study the breeding of fish and they can pursue fish farming as their occupation.

Visit to Kisan Mela: The students are taken to Agriculture mela at Faridkot as well as agriculture university Ludhiana with an aim to develop agriculture acumen in students which they can pursue as their career in this agriculture belt.

Campus Bazaar: The college organised Campus bazaar on 10th March 2022 under the aegis of Vocational Education Nai Taleem Experimental learning in collaboration with MGNCRE department of higher education, Govt of India. 3.4 Extension Activities**3.4.1**

Outcomes of Extension activities in the neighborhood community in terms of impact and sensitizing the students to social issues for their holistic development during the last five years.

Response:

The college organizes a number of extension activities to promote institute and neighborhood-community harmony and to sensitize the students towards community needs and the social issues faced by them. All the departments of the college are conscious about their responsibility of shaping students into responsible citizens of the country and they efficiently perform their duty by making students aware of various social, environmental and medical issues.

The college effectively runs 5 units of NSS (National Service Scheme) and has adopted one village Chahal and one basti Jogian Wali. Through the units of NSS, the college undertakes various extension activities in neighbourhood community in general and these areas in particular. NSS organizes several one day camps every year in nearby villages and several activities are carried out by NSS volunteers addressing social issues, environmental issues and medical issues.

Social Issues: The NSS students visit various villages near the college and make the people aware of the importance of cleanliness, education for all, Women empowerment, National Integrity and unity etc. Social interaction, Group discussions and lectures are arranged on topics like Eradication of superstitions, Beti Bacho Beti Padhao, road safety Voters awareness, female foeticide etc. Blood donation camps are organized in the college and students are encouraged to donate blood in these camps. This sensitizes the students regarding the importance of blood in human life and how they can be important as saviours of human life.

Environmental Issues: Staff and the students of the college participate every year in Environment day Celebration on 5th June. This year (2022) District Level Environment day was celebrated and the institute played an active role in creating awareness in the people of the town towards tree plantation and

water conservation. The college staff and students are always eager to plant trees to protect the environment through Shramdan. Apart from this rainwater harvesting is also carried out in the college. The NSS unit of the college organized lectures in different villages on the harmful effects of stubble burning and to carry out Soil and Water Testing. The institution also creates environmental awareness through self example. We at Brijindra college have zero tolerance for plastic and have declared our college plastic free zone.

Medical issues: The institution arranges for lectures for students on AIDs awareness, health and hygiene and dental hygiene, Diet awareness etc. students are also guided by the staff on issues related to mental health and depression etc. Health check -up camps, Blood donation camps, Dental checkup camp are organized in the college at regular intervals.

During the Covid-19 lockdown our NSS volunteers distributed ration, sanitizers, masks, gloves etc to the poor and needy people. The students also helped stray animals and birds by feeding them during the lockdown crisis.

All the above mentioned activities have positive impact on the students and develop student community relationship, leadership skills and self confidence of students leading to holistic overall development of the students. It also helps in cultivating hidden potential of students and in creating awareness among students.

The institution gives utmost importance to the overall development of the students and organizes various sports, games, and cultural activities on the campus regularly. There is a full fledged sports department and music department with intelligent, efficient and active teachers to train the students.

Sports department: The college has 08 Playgrounds including one cricket ground, one hockey ground, one lawn Tennis court, one Astro Turf, Volley ball ground, Badminton Court etc. There are also arrangements for Indoor games like Table tennis, Chess etc.

- **Cricket Ground:** The cricket ground of the college is maintained by the District Cricket association vied an MOU signed with them. This ground has served as a training area for several cricket lovers throughout the district. Many district and state level cricket tournaments are held in this ground.
- **Astro turf:** The college astro turf, though a property of the college is used by various hockey clubs for preparing national level hockey players. Here it is pertinent to remark that our hockey grounds have served as hockey nursery for India and has given a number of Olympian S. Inder Singh, S. Balbir Singh, S.Chand Singh, S. Rajinder Singh (Arjuna Awardee, Dronacharia award, Coach Indian Hockey Team), S. Saroop Singh, Mrs. Rupa Saini (Captain Indian women hockey team. Arjuna Awardee. Sports Director of Puniab). Principal Mrs. Prema Saini (World Cup), Principal Mrs. Kulwant Kaur Sandhu (World Cup), and many other players of National and International fame. S. Harbans Singh who is International Hockey umpire is also a product of this college.
- **Swimming Pool:** The well maintained swimming pool of the college, the only one of its kind in the whole area is used by state and national level players for practice. This renowned pool of the area caters to the needs of the entire area.
- **Gymnasium:** Fully equipped with all the modern machines and gadgets for the benefit of the students and the staff to keep them fit and healthy.
- **Open lawns** of the college serve as yoga grounds for the students.

Music Department: The music department of the college is fully equipped with all musical instruments needed for the growth and development of the students of music like Guitar, Tabla, Harmonium etc. Besides winning medals and prizes in various competitions organized at Zonal and Inter-Zonal level, the college has been awarded **trophy for music at consecutive 5 zonal youth festivals**. The students are

encouraged to participate in various cultural activities inside and outside the campus to enable for the personal growth of the students. The head of the department himself is a winner of many awards.

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1

Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

Response:

The Guru Nanak Dev Library at Govt. Brijindra College Faridkot is integrated knowledge resource centre comprising of nearly 49 thousand books, 78 new books of MA Music Vocal, periodicals, references, national and international journals and CD-ROMs. The library is fully automated with the books displayed on the Koha app. Any person can open the app and access the availability of books in the Brijindra Library. Online access to full text and databases from 17 reputed publishers through E-Shodhsindhu.

The following facilities are available in library NPTEL, E Granthalaya, E-PG Pathshala, MIT, Project Gutenberg, Universal Digital Library, INFLIBNET-N-LIST membership. All e-resources are accessible locally within the campus as well as remotely. College Library building is centrally located and well laid out and maintains the right atmosphere for learning. Library building has provision for both individual and group studies. Adequate space is provided for browsing and relaxed reading. The library also houses rich reference collection viz., Encyclopedia Britannica, Encyclopedia Americana, Specific Subject Encyclopedias, Year Books, Atlases and other reference material. Guru Nanak Dev Library holdings also include project reports on various subjects. The library also provides access to Internet as well as CD/DVD based electronic resources Provision has also been made to allow downloading/printing of material from these resources. It has excellent ICT infrastructure with adequate bandwidth for fast and seamless access to Internet. Following Initiatives are taken by the College:

1. Free WI-FI, internet access to download documents. A printout facility has also been provided for the students in the library.
2. Organization of Book Exhibitions: The college takes initiative to organize book fair in general at various times and in particular at the Baba Farid Aagman Purb Mela in which various national publishers organize exhibition of books in English, Hindi and Punjabi. This initiative enables the students to get out of their mobiles and join the world of hard copies of books.
3. Display of new books: The new books of the library are displayed in the shelf marked new Books for the students to read and cherish them.
4. System of recommendation for purchase of books through Departments: Various departments of the college send demands to the Library regarding their need for books. The library orders these books and gets them provided at the earliest.
5. The students and staff are encouraged to visit library frequently. For this purpose there is an The college has initiated a new concept to help needy students by setting up a corner in the library which is

named as 'Imaandaari ki Dukaan'. Students and staff donate books for this corner which are stacked properly. Any student who needs them can enter his name in the register and carry the book when needed and return when he/she has read the book. This helps the students to read books which they cannot purchase.

6. There is a register for the staff also in the library in which the college teaching and non- teaching staff makes entry of their visit.

Smart Classrooms: There are nine smart classrooms with over-head mounted projectors and speakers for use of audio-visual resources and have been very useful for class presentations and in the use of power point presentations and screening of relevant films. There is one smart hybrid classroom equipped with state-of-the-art multi-media teaching aid with 65 inches LCD internet enabled interactive screen with interactive panel and visualiser with embedded scanners, cameras and speakers.

There are two interactive panels , one interactive podium and two audio podium for effective curriculum delivery.

Recording Studio: To facilitate faculty prepare lectures and other ICT enabled lessons which require recording facilities, a state of the art, sound proof wifi enabled recording studio has been setup with the latest recording facilities such as good cameras, lapel mikes and studio lighting for optimum recordings.

E-Resources in the College Library: The library at GBC is computerized and ICT enabled with the latest library resources for the ease and benefit of students and faculty.

Institution frequently updates its IT facilities and provides sufficient bandwidth for internet connection

including Wi-Fi The Institution has 68 computers, 1 Computer center, 1 fully computerised administrative office and 2 servers. The college performed its teaching learning process online due to covid lockdown. For this the college had to update its server and it purchased a new server for the unlimited online teaching process. apart from this one server was purchased for BCA lab. The institution updates its IT facilities as per the needs and requirements of various departments. 6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1

The institution has performance appraisal system, effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for career development/progression

Response:

Performance Appraisal System

Teaching and Non-Teaching staff undergoes performance Appraisal as per guidelines of DPI Colleges Govt. of Punjab. Both Teaching and Non-Teaching staff have to fill their ACR (Annual Confidential

Report). Then the Principal of the HEI finalizes the scores based upon the documental evidences submitted by the staff.

Teaching Staff: Based on API scores designed by UGC the faculty is encouraged to take up teaching learning, administrative works and more research initiatives in their respective areas of inclination and passion.

Non-Teaching Staff: The Principal directly monitors the non teaching staff and regularly conducts meetings, supervise the administrative and financial aspects such as fee collection, scholarship status etc. The Non-teaching staff have to keep a record of their work. Based on guidelines issued by Govt. of Punjab, the non-teaching staff is accessed on the bases of administrative work performed by them.

Academic Audit: Every year an academic audit is conducted by the office of the DPI Colleges Govt. of Punjab. For this, expert committee constituting of the Principal/senior faculty of different colleges is constituted to inspect the HEIs. This team assesses the performance of each department. An exit meeting is also held in which the staff are intimated about their shortfalls/gap if any and advised to improve further. Principal has to submit action taken report on the remarks pointed out the academic audit team to the office of the DPI Colleges Govt. of Punjab.

Welfare Schemes

The teaching and non-teaching staff form the basic foundation of the college. The college works proactively to ensure the well being of the staff by setting up effective welfare measures for teaching and non- teaching staff. The College has effective welfare measures in place for its teaching and non-teaching staff. The various welfare schemes are as follows:

1. **Medical leave:** The Permanent faculty members are entitled to medical leaves as per government rules.
2. **Maternity Leave:** Faculty are also granted maternity leave as per Government of India rules.
3. **Child Care leave:** Child Care Leave is granted to female Government servants to look after their child till 18 years of age to meet their needs like exams, sickness as per Government of India rules. The teaching and non teaching staff are given the benefit of child care leave as per norms.
4. **Medical Reimbursement:** The college offers medical reimbursement facility for all permanent employees (Teaching and Non-Teaching) as per the rules of Punjabi University Patiala. Employees submit medical bills and get reimbursed as per the rules.
5. **Pension:** Permanent Retired teaching and non-teaching receive pension as per University norms.
6. **Leave Travel Allowance:** The permanent staff is entitled to Leave Travel Allowance as per rules.
7. All the non-doctoral staff members are encouraged to get enrolled for part-time Ph.D. program.

All Utilization Certificates to various grant giving agencies are also countersigned by the CA. All Financial Statements upto 2022-23 have been certified by him.

Internal Audit is conducted by the Bursar of the college. Preaudit of major receipts and payments and concurrent/post audit of allother receipts and payments is done by Deputy Controller Finance and Accounts. He also pre-checks salary fixations, pension and gratuity payments and final payments of GPF.

3. The institution has constituted Anti Sexual Harassment Cell where students can complain regarding any untoward happening. Strict confidentiality is maintained by the Cell to encourage the complainant to lodge complaints without fear and it provides counselling to the complainants and the respondents independently.
4. To enhance safety & security on the campus CCTV cameras have been installed, round the clock security is provided by the security guards and Faculty has been directed to keep the door of the lecture hall open during classes.
5. A Complaint Box is placed outside in the girl's common room where the girls can write and put their complaints. These complaints are duly sorted out by the principal by constituting a committee.

Besides the students, the institution also promotes gender equity to the staff by providing maternity leave, child care leave and leave on adoption of child as per the rules and regulations of the Punjab Government to the Female employees of the institution.

This is a humble initiative to cherish and celebrate the rich cultural heritage of our country, to be able to preserve and propagate its history, traditions and values. For promotng unity in diversity, tolerance and harmony the college organizes programs every month.
- 3. NSS:** The NSS unit of the college has adopted 2 villages Chahal and Basti Jogian wali. Every year NSS conducts special camps there directed towards various social issues impacting the lives of the people in the community viz-a -viz instilling esocial and cultural values in the young students.
- 4. Celebration of Language Days:** At GBC we celebrate language diversity and integrate it in our lives by celebrating Hindi Diwas, English Language day, Punjabi bhasha day, and Sanskrit Diwas.

The Context:

‘Khoon Daan Maha Daan’ began as a student initiative outreach programme under the aegis of the National Service Scheme at Govt. Brijindra College in 2000. It has since grown from strength to strength, diversifying its objectives to empower and aid the society to the maximum. It deals with the following challenges

- The scarcity of blood in the blood banks
- The locating of people who are willing and healthy to donate blood in times of crisis, personal or national
- To keep students aware of good health
- To abstain students from drug abuse as it weakens the body

The Practice:

The Blood donation camp is organized under the aegis of Govt. Brijindra College Faridkot since the last 20 years. It underlines the institution’s commitment to meaningful and consistent social intervention, as well as to its commitment of the need to inculcate a strong sense in our own students of a holistic, social consciousness and connectedness with community. The institution aims to blur the boundaries and dichotomies of the modern world via sharing the basic life component that is blood. In this blood donation camp, students and the staff of the college zealously participate in donating blood which can save several lives in future.

- The programme is initiated with the staff motivating the students and allaying their fears related to blood donation. These lectures enthuse in the students the knowledge of oneness and attunes them to the real meaning of life which lies in giving.
- Then on 19th September, the students are allowed to settle in the sanjivani hall of the college where a team of doctors from Guru Gobind Singh Medical college or the civil Hospital are invited to assist in the process of blood donation.
- The students are then offered fruits and milk as a good will gesture by the NGOs a way of saying Thank you.
- The students are also given a certificate and a batch which authorizes them to get blood free of cost from any blood bank at the time of need.

Evidence of Success:

This initiative showcases a world full of possibilities. It offers help and guidance to more and more students to become aware and to embark on their own quest of becoming meaningful for the society. This creates an inter connectedness and a relational sociality in the students which articulates the real meaning of humanity. What emerged out as more enriching and valuable was how this social service broke barriers between diverse spaces and multiple classes with students donating blood with full zeal and joy. In this material world where people don't believe in offering anything in the name of free service, the students of our college line up with the aim of rendering life generating blood free. The sole aim of this activity is social service. The unbreaking line of students speak volumes of the broken boundaries of differences and dichotomies and building and sharing of faith, love and respect in the budding citizens.

The Context:

The modern age is the age of social media where one can find students with a vast variety of mobiles in hand. In this race of showing off, the students have shifted away from books. The current scenario is very depressing where you can find students sans books in the classrooms. This book fair intends to be a beacon of light to guide students out of their social media created lethargy into the real world of creative writers and their books. As students learn more by visuals, this book fair attempts to invite budding writers, poets and dramatists and their meeting with the students create the thrust which is need to make the students grow their literary tastes. The challenges addressed in this book fair:

- Reading writing lethargy
- Lack of impetus to learn more
- Lack of inspiration for growth and development
- Lost identity of the students
- Lack of management skills

The Practice:

An annual 5 days book fair is organized in the college from 19th to 23rd September. This book fair is a very good effort to connect the students with books in the current time of social media where students are more bent towards reading online and hard copies of books have been given a step motherly treatment. In this fair, the students are introduced to budding and established Punjabi poets, novelists and dramatists. The interaction with these literary people ignites the flame of reading books whose enviable position has been overtaken by the mass media. There is also a display of English, Hindi and Punjabi books by publishers from throughout the country in the college, to encourage students to read more books and stay away from the social media.

Evidence of Success

Free book stalls are installed in this fair. Book sellers are given free accommodation and food. There is a langar service for the students and the guests in the fair. The recording, photography and u tube streaming are done by the students or alumni of the college. The books are made available to the students at much less than the printed cost. 25-50% discount is offered to the students.

In the year 2018-19 books worth 20 lakhs were sold. In the year 2019-20 this rose to 22 lakhs whereas in the year 2020-21 books worth 24 lakhs were sold and in 2021-22 this amount came to 26 lakhs. In the year 2022-23, the efforts put together via all the available fronts of the college have started showing its dividends. This year books worth Rs 35 Lakhs were purchased by the students of the college as well the entire district. The programme was streamed live on U tube channel which was watched live by 30-40 thousand people.

The fair is conducted in open so at times the inclement weather is the biggest hurdle.
